WE CAN now all do more for the environment with the news that plastic bottles can be recycled in Cambridge, South Cambridgeshire and East Cambridgeshire.

Seventy banks across these three districts have been installed in response to requests by residents for plastic bottle recycling facilities.

Funding was won by Cambridgeshire County Council from Central Government, and the banks were purchased earlier this year.

The funding will go towards the plastic banks, as well as for improving other recycling services across Cambridgeshire.

There are many different types of plastics used in packaging - and some are not presently recyclable due to market availability.

Residents will only be able to recycle empty plastic bottles, for example for water, squash, fizzy drinks, cleaning products, and toiletries such

as shampoo and shower gel. Please squash and remove lids.

The bottles that residents provide are taken to local sites to be baled up and sent off for sorting and reprocessing.

There is a wide range of products made from recycled plastics such as bin liners, construction piping and insulation, fencing, garden furniture, water butts, compost bins, anoraks, fleeces, stationery and fibre filling for sleeping bags and duvets.
